# What Bird Is that?

Ric Walter identified the bird in the December BHLG newsletter correctly, well done Ric. The bird was a Brown-headed Honeyeater (Melithreptus brevirostris). Brownheaded Honeyeaters feed primarily on insects in tree canopies and lower shrubs as well as nectar from flowers in mature trees. The consumption of insects from branches, bark and leaves by birds such as Brown-headed Honeyeaters is an example of a behavioural ecosystem service, ecosystem services performed by birds include pollination, predation, seed predation and seed dispersal.

This issues mystery birds were noticed when they were making squeaking noises to each other and grooming in a River red gum. Do you know what this bird is? A tip to these



birds' identity can be found in the bare area around their eyes which is mentioned in one of the common names of this species. Email us with your 'what bird is this?' answer, the first person to answer correctly will have their name published in the next newsletter.



## Design to bring back native wildlife.

#### Bringing back endangered wildlife.

Bringing back endangered wildlife to rural and urban areas is one of the significant challenges of this decade. Australia's wildlife is the 'canary in the coal mine ' and an indication of the health of our living environment. We need to reverse the current trend of species extinctions to ensure clean air, clean water and a robust biodiversity for future generations.

#### 'Plant it and they will come'.

Native fauna will return if we provide them with what they need. Your garden or back paddock can become part of the solution to the continued loss of habitat Australia wide. Imagine a plantation that is teeming with wildlife and where the plants spread their seed and regenerate naturally for 200 years and more. What about a plantation that also provides income and useful products for the farm. If we design well, a new plantation will continue into perpetuity providing habitat and income generating resources just as native woodlands and forests did in the past.


#### Sustainable biorich landscapes.

Sustainable biorich landscapes mimic natural environments and function like natural environments. They provide fauna and flora with all the essential elements that they

need for a sustainable ecology. Like natural environments they are diverse, they are wide enough to provide plentiful protected habitat for wildlife, their structural layers add safety and efficiency of foraging and their links to remnant vegetation and water enable plants and animals to interact and evolve. They provide habitat and food resources for a diversity of wildlife.

## Rabbit baiting programs across the region.

Pindone is a cumulative poison. To be effective, rabbits need to ingest the Pindone carrots on three separate occasions over a one-week period. Each rabbit needs to consume between 15-30 grams. For example: for a three to five acre property you would need 15kg of bait in total. You would collect one 5kg bag on each delivery day and lay the bait on the same evening. The total cost would be  $3 \times \$28 = \$84$  (inc. GST), for three 5kg bags. Please find contact details below.

diversity of Dung Beetles in our local farming systems.

We need sites to undertake monitoring for a 12 month period.

10 SFS monthly monitored sites will be distributed evenly across the UBLN and GLN. We would love to add extra sites to our monitoring by training landholders to do their own trapping and monitoring on their properties.

Training for this will be provided.

# Message from our CEO. Landcare Victoria Inc. Year in review.

As we approach the end of another year, it is the right time to allow ourselves in the Landcare Victoria Inc. (LVi) community to reflect on our progress and some of our achievements for 2021.

We have completed our Landcare Victoria Strategic Plan, clarifying and communicating our vision and purpose and our goals. The plan is available to download on the LVi website

Our role in the development of the Landcare Led Bushfire Recovery Program has demonstrated the valuable contribution of LVi in the development and delivery of large scale landcare programs, working with Landcare Australia, the National Landcare Network and landcare community groups.

For the first time, DELWP has been able to fund projects to be delivered in the first half of 2022, and recently the R E Ross Trust provided \$50,000 to support a pilot capacity development project. These investments reflect growing confidence in the value and capability of Landcare Victoria Inc.

We have also established Landcare Victoria Inc. as a Deductible Gift Recipient status, so we can now accept tax deductible donations in support of landcare. This facility is accessible to all members of Landcare Victoria Inc.

We migrated our membership data onto a new online database with much greater functionality than its predecessor, which has streamlined the collection, management and reporting of data, bringing benefits



to our members through reduced paperwork.

We also simplified our membership renewals process this year by separating the requirement for provision of Member Group data from the payment of membership fees.

So far, members have responded positively. In renewing our association insurance policy this year, we were able to rationalise our cover through a single broker without an increase in cost.

Next year holds much promise for LVi and its members. Some of our key initiatives for 2022 include:

- A new website to better communicate landcare achievements and to serve as a source of information and resources for our members and partners • A Members forum to be held in Beechworth in May 2022
- A major engagement project that will establish the basis for a new Landcare Plan for Victoria
- Review and rationalisation of

landcare communications in partnership with DELWP and the Catchment Management Authorities - Development and implementation of a capacity building program aimed at ensuring our Member Groups have knowledge and resources to operate effectively and efficiently

- Based on a process of consultation, establishment of a knowledge and skills framework for landcare professionals
- Further refinement of risk management arrangements to help ensure our insurance policies remain affordable and relevant to landcare community needs
- An online membership census early in the new year will make the process of providing key information easier for our members, and help build a strong story about the priorities and activities of landcare in Victoria.

I would like to thank the LVi Team - Amanda Grace, Claire Hetzel and Elissa Kasch, who are devoted to the landcare cause and a joy to work with. Thank you also to our Chair - Jane Carney and the other members of the LVi Board - who are all volunteers, for their leadership and guidance.

We must also acknowledge with thanks the continuing support from the Phillipson and Crothers families who through their donations and advice have done so much to underpin our development and growth.

## Platypus e-DNA survey results are in!


Last week the Geelong Landcare Network/Friends of the Barwon organising committee received the draft results from the extensive survey of platypus e-DNA in the Lower Barwon, Leigh and Moorabool rivers conducted in October last year.

This is the first systematic survey of platypus populations in the lower Barwon Catchment and fills an important gap in contemporary platypus distribution following similar projects in the upper Barwon and Moorabool Regions

Over 60 people were involved in the survey and of the 38 sites sampled 39% indicated definitive positive result. The final results will be presented and explained by Josh Griffiths from EnviroDNA in a webinar in late February.
